Once you have downloaded the app, click on 'Find your school' and type in 'EDUCATION QUEENS-LAND'.






Then you will need to login with your child's MIS ID (this is the username the students use to log on to our school computers).

# AROUND THE CLASSROOMS

STOP PRESS: International fame for our SSS Year Nine Science Students in wake of discovery.

In 2022, Mr Spencer nominated our Springsure State School Year Nine Science students to collaborate with scientist, Dr, Any Howe from the Sunshine Coast University, in a national scientific study to capture insects from our local environment for research and identification.

Under the guidance of Dr Howe, our then Year Seven Science students, set-up a malaise trap behind our school and recorded environmental data on a daily basis over several weeks. Each morning the students would collect samples, package appropriately and mail these to taxonomists, Dr Erinn Fagan-Jeffries and Mollie Slater-Baker from the University of Adelaide. The insects were sorted, catalogued and transported to Canada where scientists conducted further research including, photography and DNA testing. The results have now been returned to us.

The exciting news is our students have discovered a whole new species of insect in this world. She, yes a female, currently known as **Apanteles "MRSB41"** belongs to the order of Hymenoptera (wasps/bees/ants) and family Braconidae ('braconid' wasp). Below are the first scientific photographs of our wasp.

Our students involvement is not yet complete, as they have earned the right to name this new species and will be guided by taxonomists over the next few weeks in the naming process. All Year Nine Science students will soon have bragging rights "internationally" as their names will be recorded in history within scientific journals as the discoverers of this little lady of Springsure. Students have been asked to start thinking of a suitable name based upon the characteristics of the species. A university press release will formally announce the discovery and name in due course.

#### Some details about the characteristics of MRSB41:


This is a parasitoid wasp! The mother wasp lays her eggs in a caterpillar (but we don't know which one, as all the specimens we have are from traps or nets) and then the baby wasps eat the caterpillar insides... while it's still alive!

- the tibia is mostly dark, with a little bit of pale area at the top.
- the specimen is quite bumpy we call this 'sculpture' or 'rugosity.' The texture of it is really rough. Some species are much smoother.
- The forewings have a bit of a very faint brown tint or shading on them But you might also notice something cool about it!
